
### **Method**

Nationally representative telephone sample of 945 seniors 65+ conducted October 16-25, 2009. The margin of error (MOE) for the full sample is  $\pm 3.2$  percentage points (pps). We discuss the following groups in this report:

- Medicare Rx coverage (both stand-alone and Advantage) (N=409 MOE is ±4.8 pps.)
- Medicare stand-alone plan (N=207 MOE is ±6.8 pps.)
- Medicare Advantage plan (N=202 MOE is +6.9 pps.)
- Dual eligibles (N=72 MOE is ±11.5 pps.)
- Income <\$15K (N=64 MOE is ±12.3 pps.)</li>
- Take 6+ prescriptions (N=100 MOE is <u>+</u>9.8 pps.)
- Have disability (N=102 MOE is ±9.7 pps.)

The study also included a sample of 400 seniors in FL and 400 seniors in NY with Medicare Rx plans, two states with large senior populations.

### Primary Rx Coverage: All Seniors 90% say they have Rx coverage—10% do not.



The primary focus of this report is on seniors who have **Medicare Rx coverage**, in both stand-alone and Medicare Advantage plans.



## **EXECUTIVE SUMMARY**

### **Executive Summary**

- Customer satisfaction with Medicare Rx remains high, with almost 9 in 10 satisfied with their current coverage. In fact, 6 in 10 are <u>very</u> satisfied.
  - Satisfaction has increased ten points since early 2006.
- Seniors remain positive about the program, with the vast majority saying their plan works well and is delivering what it said it would. Many say they're better off now than before they had Medicare Rx and are saving money. Large majorities would recommend the program to their peers.
- Nearly 3 in 4 are following health care reform discussions in Washington, D.C. As many favor a reform proposal that would reduce costs for beneficiaries who reach the coverage gap by requiring pharmaceutical companies to provide discounts on drugs in the gap.





## Satisfaction

# Almost 9 in 10 seniors with Medicare Rx say they're satisfied with their prescription drug coverage.




### Main Reasons for Satisfaction with Medicare Rx (Unaided)

"My prescription drug coverage is fully covered. I do not have to pay any co-pays or any monthly premiums."

"Because I get the right medicine at a low cost."

"I get it by mail and for three months at a time and my premiums are not too expensive."



"Medicare takes care of the cost of my prescriptions. I do not have to pay anything or worry about not having my medicines on time."

"The price is right and the service is good."

"Price is reasonable.

Before I had it, I was
paying 3 times more, so
now it's more convenient."

"They pay very well on all prescriptions. I only pay five dollars per prescription and I have no coverage gap."


"They do a great job of making sure their clients are well taken care of."

### Main Reasons Not Satisfied with Medicare Rx (Unaided)

"My medicine is so expensive that I have to dip into my savings to pay for them, medicines are unreasonably high."

"The prices go up all the time."

"I hate when I get to my donut hole. I have to pay for all my medicine out of pocket and it is very expensive. Sometimes I can't fill them because of the cost."




"Because it doesn't cover all of my medicine and I have to pay the rest out of pocket. ." "Because the plan or company deletes the pills to different categories, they try to get you to take generic type."

"It's too high and can't afford it anymore."


"I hate when I get to my donut hole. I have to pay for all my medicine out of pocket and it is very expensive. Sometimes I can't fill them because of the cost"

Since September 2006, more than 8 in 10 seniors with Medicare Rx have reported being satisfied with their prescription drug coverage. More than half have reported being very satisfied since September 2007.



# Seniors with Medicare Rx coverage report similar levels of satisfaction as those with other kinds of plans.


Overall, how satisfied are you with your prescription drug coverage?








## Dual eligibles, those with low incomes, and those living with disabilities are satisfied.



### Across political party lines, seniors are satisfied.




# Satisfaction is *highest* among seniors who spend the least amount of money.

6 in 10 say they've lowered their prescription drug spending.





# Nearly all seniors who are using their plans and have received medications, say their plans work well.


Nearly 7 in 10 say their plan works VERY well.

IF RECEIVED MEDS: And, how well has your prescription drug plan worked for you?




# The trend has been consistently positive since the program started.

IF RECEIVED MEDICINES: How well has your prescription drug plan worked for you?




# Both those with Original Medicare plans (PDP) and those with Medicare Advantage plans (MA-PD) say their plans work well.

IF RECEIVED MEDICINES: How well has your prescription drug plan worked for you?




## Across demographic groups, there is agreement that the plans work well.

How well has your prescription drug plan worked for you? Percent Saying Plan Works Well




# Most seniors are very happy with customer service and feel their plan offers good value for the money.



## Most say they would recommend Medicare Rx to other seniors.


If you were giving advice to someone who is enrolling in Medicare for the first time, would you tell them to sign up for a Medicare prescription drug plan, or not?

# Three-quarters have been following the discussions about health care reform closely.


How closely have you been following discussions in Washington about health care reform—very closely, somewhat closely, not too closely, or not at all?




# The majority say they've heard of the coverage gap, but many have not. Four in 10 say their plan has a gap.

Have you heard anything about the coverage gap in Medicare prescription drug plans, sometimes called the "donut hole"?


In most Medicare prescription drug plans, if your medicine costs over \$2,700 per year you have to pay the next \$3,450 entirely out of pocket before 95% of your prescriptions are completely covered. This is sometimes referred to as the "coverage gap" or "donut hole." Does your plan have a coverage gap or donut hole, or did you purchase extra coverage so you don't have this gap? If you're not sure, just say so.






# One in four seniors feel affected by the coverage gap through someone they know.

## Four in 10 of those potentially impacted by the gap are concerned they might reach it; over half are not concerned.




# Only 3 in 10 recalled hearing news about discussions in Washington, D.C. to lower the coverage gap.

### Large majorities support a proposal to shrink the coverage gap by requiring pharmaceutical companies to pay the costs.

I'm going to read you a description of a proposal currently being discussed in Washington, D.C. and I'd like you to tell me if you support or oppose this proposal. Starting as soon as next year in July, people with a Medicare prescription drug plan who reach the coverage gap would get an immediate 50% price reduction on all brand name drugs while in the gap. Pharmaceutical companies would be required to pay the costs and there would be no major cost increase to taxpayers or people with Medicare prescription drug plans.





## Reasons For Not Having Prescription Coverage

### Conclusions

### Conclusions

- Medicare Rx beneficiaries continue to feel satisfied with the Medicare Rx program because it offers good value for the cost.
  - Overall satisfaction has grown from 78% to 88% (10 points) since early 2006;
     those very satisfied have increased from 50% to 59% (9 points);
  - 95% feel fortunate to have Part D and 93% say it gives them peace of mind;
  - 96% say their plan is convenient;
  - 87% say their plan offers good value—62% say they've lowered their prescription drug spending;
  - 87% say their plan is delivering what it said it would;
  - 81% would advise other seniors to sign up for the program;
  - 80% say it covers their doctor-prescribed medicines—58% strongly agree;
  - 68% feel better off now that they have Part D; and,
  - Almost 3 in ten now get medications they once had to skip or ration.
- There is widespread support for a reform proposal to shrink the coverage gap without raising plan premiums by requiring pharmaceutical companies to pay the costs.
