

Seniors' Opinions About Medicare Rx: Fifth Year Update

September 2010



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METHOD


Method

Nationally representative telephone sample of 1,243 seniors 65+ conducted August 26-29, 2010. The margin of error (MOE) for the full sample is ±2.8 percentage points (pps). We discuss the following groups in this report:

- Medicare Rx coverage (both stand-alone and Advantage) (N=401 MOE is ±5.0 pps.)
- Medicare stand-alone plan (N=222 MOE is ±6.7 pps.)
- Medicare Advantage plan (N=179 MOE is ±7.5 pps.)
- Dual eligibles (N=113 MOE is ±9.4 pps.)
- Income <\$15K (N=209 MOE is ±6.9 pps.)
- Take 6+ prescriptions (N=349 MOE is <u>+</u>5.4 pps.)
- Have disability (N=267 MOE is ±6.1 pps.)

Primary Rx Coverage: All Seniors

90% say they have Rx coverage—10% do not.



The primary focus of this report is on seniors who have **Medicare Rx coverage**, in both stand-alone and Medicare Advantage plans.




EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Executive Summary

- Customer satisfaction with Medicare Rx remains high, with over 8 in 10 satisfied with their current coverage. More than half are very satisfied.
- Seniors continue to applaud the program, with 9 in 10 reporting their plan works well, is convenient, gives them peace of mind, and they feel fortunate to have their coverage. Large majorities continue to say their plan offers good value and they would recommend the program to their peers.
- Most Medicare Rx coverage recipients have heard about the coverage gap, or "donut hole" – up slightly from 2009. However, fewer than half have heard about measures to gradually close the gap.
 - Despite low knowledge, support for measures to close the gap is strong, as more than 6 in 10 seniors favor the 50% discount on brand-name drugs in 2011, the gradual elimination of the gap by 2020, and the \$250 tax-free check.

Executive Summary

- Nearly 7 in 10 are aware of the coverage gap, but many are not aware of provisions in the new health reform bill to gradually reduce the gap. Once beneficiaries with Rx plans learn about these measures, support is very strong.
 - Only 2 in 10 are aware that, starting in 2011, people who reach the coverage gap will get a 50% discount on brand-name drugs.


DETAILED FINDINGS



Satisfaction

Seniors remain satisfied with their Medicare prescription drug coverage.

Over 8 in 10 are satisfied with the program.




Primary Reasons for Satisfaction with Medicare Rx (Unaided)

"I can go to any doctor at any time at no charge to me. I can get my medicines at little to no cost."

"It is user friendly and it pays the bills I have."

"I am satisfied with the way they pay for my medications. I get my medications on time."



"I get generic prescriptions, but it hasn't cost me anything and I haven't hit the donut hole. I've been very satisfied with it and am 86 years old living on a very limited income."

"They were very dependable, I got help when I needed it."


"It covers everything that we need it to cover, we have never had a problem." "They pay the majority of the cost of my prescriptions, I don't have much out of pocket expense." "I have never had any problems with it as it is simple, not complicated."

Primary Reasons Not Satisfied with Medicare Rx (Unaided)

"I don't think that they cover enough. With medications as high as they are, I really do not think that they cover enough."

"My premiums are \$44 a month and I could buy it for less than that on my own."

"Because some of the prescription medicine that I have to take is so expensive as compared to others that I take. It costs so much more than what Medicare pays."



"I don't like how much I have to pay and I can't get a generic on one of my prescriptions." "Because of both the price of medicines going up as well as the donut hole, I have to pay the full amount. Medicare raised its premium cost."

"It seems like I have to pay more and more out of pocket.."


"It doesn't pay very much and only covers a percentage. They only pay so much and then you drop into the donut hole."

KRC RESEARCH

More than 8 in 10 seniors have reported satisfaction with their Rx coverage since Fall 2006.

Since Fall 2007, more than half report being very satisfied with their coverage.

Overall, how satisfied are you with your prescription drug coverage?






Seniors of both genders and various age brackets are satisfied with their Rx coverage.




Dual eligibles, those with low incomes, and those living with disabilities remain satisfied.



Across political party lines, seniors are satisfied with their prescription drug coverage.




Satisfaction is *highest* among seniors with the lowest monthly premiums and out-of-pocket costs.

Medicare Rx continues to meet seniors' expectations.


8 in 10 say their plan is delivering what they expected upon enrollment, and 6 in 10 say they have lowered the amount of money they spend on medications.


How Medicare Rx Works

Nearly all seniors who are using their plan and have received medications say their plan works well.


2 in 3 say their plan works very well.

IF RECEIVED MEDS: How well has your prescription drug plan worked for you?




The trend has remained highly positive and consistent since the program began.

IF RECEIVED MEDICINES: How well has your prescription drug plan worked for you?





Seniors across demographic cohorts say their Rx plans work well.


How well has your prescription drug plan worked for you?

Percent saying plan works well





Two-thirds of seniors strongly agree that they understand how their plan works, that it is convenient, and works without hassle.

Seniors give Medicare Rx as high or higher marks in 2010 as they did at the beginning of the program.



High levels of satisfaction impact the desire to change plans. Only 1 in 3 seniors say they're likely to shop around and compare Medicare Rx plans during the annual enrollment.


Half say they are <u>not at all</u> likely to comparison shop.

The vast majority would recommend Medicare Rx to someone enrolling in Medicare for the first time.


If you were giving advice to someone who is enrolling in Medicare for the first time, would you tell them to sign up for a Medicare prescription drug plan, or not?




Information and Coverage Gap

Have you read, seen, or heard anything recently about Medicare prescription drug plans in the news? If so, what is the last thing you read, saw, or heard?







About 1 in 3 received information about prescription drug plans. The plurality received information from insurance companies.




Nearly 7 in 10 seniors have heard something about the coverage gap, and half say their plan has one.

Have you heard anything about the coverage gap in Medicare prescription drug plans, sometimes called the "donut hole"?




In most Medicare prescription drug plans, if your medicine costs over \$2,830 per year you have to pay the next \$3,610 entirely out of pocket before 95% of your prescriptions are completely covered. This is sometimes referred to as the "coverage gap" or "donut hole." Does your plan have a coverage gap or donut hole, or did you purchase extra coverage so you don't have this gap? If you're not sure, just say so.




Roughly 3 in 10 say they have personally reached the coverage gap, with a quarter saying they know of someone who reached the gap in the last year.

Did anyone you know—such as a family member or friend—reach the coverage gap either last year or this year and have to pay for their prescriptions entirely out-of-pocket?




Close to 4 in 10 seniors who have <u>not</u> reached the gap are personally concerned they may hit it.




Despite concerns about the gap, large numbers have <u>not</u> heard about reforms that will gradually eliminate the gap.

CONCLUSIONS

Conclusions

- Medicare Rx beneficiaries continue to feel satisfied with the program because it offers good value for the cost.
 - Overall satisfaction has grown from 78% to 84% (6 points) since early 2006; over half (53%) are very satisfied;
 - 94% feel fortunate to have Part D and say it gives them peace of mind;
 - 93% say their plan is convenient;
 - 85% would advise other seniors to sign up for the program;
 - 84% say their plan offers good value—62% say they have lowered their prescription drug spending;
 - 84% say their plan is delivering what it said it would;
 - 66% feel better off now that they have Part D; and,
 - Almost 3 in 10 (27%) now get medications they once had to skip or ration.
- With satisfaction so high, few say they plan to compare plans, despite the fact that many might be able to get better value for the money.
- Seniors are not hearing much about Medicare Rx in the news. Most of what
 they are hearing is negative. Thus, there is relatively low awareness of the
 provisions to reduce and eliminate the coverage gap. However, once
 seniors hear about these changes, they are strongly supportive.



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
